RATIONALE BEHIND THE BOOK

Hanoi, Vietnam's capital city, is one of the most beautiful urban sites in Southeast Asia. It was founded in 1010, under the name of "Thang Long", as the seat of the Vietnamese emperor in the middle of the Red River delta. Through history various influences blended there and today form an inspiring mélange of architecture styles: relics of stately grandeur from the imperial era, lavish tree-lined boulevards from French colonial rule; ostentatious villas in quiet gardens; numerous peaceful pagodas; innumerable buildings representative of the peak of socialist planned economy; and new buildings signaling Đổi mới, growth and the capitalist economy. The City Council has ambitious plans and its goal is to develop Hanoi into a modern and "civilized" metropolis (văn minh đô thi).

Hanoi's growth and economic development is at a crossroads, though. How can Hanoi position itself as a globally competitive world-class city without giving up its rich cultural and urban-architectural heritage? Further, the city has to live up to the demands of the higher living standards of its citizens; has to cope with the constant migration of the rural population to the city; overcome its massive congestion problems and, not least, provide an attractive location for international investors and knowledge-based industries. The attractiveness of the distinctive visual charms of the inner city to the much-wooed creative classes should not be underestimated. Overall, the challenge for Hanoi is to build on its uniqueness under global competition, rather than sacrificing it and becoming another nondescript global city.

The book will be in English and Vietnamese and includes the following chapters:

- 1. Hanoi from above
- 2. Change over Time (timeline photos from the past 25 years)
- 3. Architecture & Housing
- 4. People of the City
- 5. Urban Transport
- 6. Soul of the City

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In addition to the book publication the Goethe-Institut Hanoi will hold a photo exhibition entitled "My Hà Nội" with photos selected for the SOUL OF THE CITY chapter. The book launching event will be for the Frankfurt Book Fair, the exhibition in early October 2018.

Deadline for submission of photos is December 31, 2017.

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PAYMENT

This is a non-profit project, therefore we cannot pay a honorarium. However, contributors selected for publication will get space in the book to be introduced with a short note about them and a free copy of the photo book.

COPYRIGHT

Contributors maintain the copyright of their photos. All photos will be properly credited with your name in the book, on the website for the book and if used on social media.

BIO-NOTE

Contributors should provide a 100-150 word note about themselves that will be included in in the publication in English and in Vietnamese.

TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

Please initially submit your photos as low-resolution files. If selected, you will be requested to provide high-resolution files via an internet download platform, such as Dropbox or wetransfer.

The objective of the photo book is to relate an authenticity of the natural colors found in Hanoi therefore the editor recommends to not over-do the picture saturation or brilliance of photos with software applications such as Adobe Photoshop.
